
COVID-19-FOLLOW THE MONEY


The "Follow The Money" campaign is part of the Coronavirus CivActs Campaign (CCC) that tracks funds allocated by the Government of Pakistan for COVID-19 Response.

It aims to ensure that the government and the appointed Covid-19 Taskforce ensure accountability on all relief measures for the pandemic in Pakistan. The breakdown of statistics in these infographics cover the time period till September 2020.

- A relief fund of Rs.163.86 billion has been provided to vulnerable families and Panagah's.
- Rs 15.7 billion was initially allocated for fertilizers. A subsidy of Rs 1.5 billion for tractors and markup of Rs 6.8 billion on all loans for land holdings up to 12.5 acres has been disbursed by ZTBL.
- A total of Rs.14.12 billion has been provided to daily wage workers.











COVID-19 STORIES



"I still remember the days before the outbreak began, when I was able to generate a decent enough amount of income for my family. When I was young, my father passed away, and being the eldest son it was expected of me to earn money and provide financial support.

Before my mother's eyesight was affected, she used to stitch clothes, and together with my income, we would save half the total money for my three younger sisters' dowry to get them married. But with my earning being the only source for the past few years, the pandemic has affected our lives drastically."

Hassan Khan, a street vendor, shares that since the lockdown was imposed he could not make any money at all. He has been shifting his stall from one market to another, hoping he can bring a minimum amount just for two meals a day. From being able to sell 500-800 packets of French fries daily, earning between Rs.1,500-5,000 and even more on a good day, he has now gone to selling a minimum of 10 packets in a week.

"My biggest market was school children who would buy from me during their lunch breaks/off time, but with educational institutions closed for over 5 months now, it won't be wrong to say that I may no longer earn." Hassan also serves and earns a small proportion from markets where people come to shop and may decide on having a quick snack. But the lockdown has also taken that opportunity from him.

"The amount of people visiting shops has declined tremendously. They just visit for basic groceries or to go to pharmacies; they have no interest in goods being sold by street vendors. It seems to me that they think that we (street vendors) are infected by people as we are out to earn and that our food may infect them as well. What can we do? We need money! I need to feed my family. I can't stay at home."

Economic Revival



- 140 laboratories in the major cities have been designated to support COVID-19 diagnostics and the current diagnostic capacity has reached 46,726 tests per day.
- 769 Public and Private Hospitals in all major cities with 29,700 beds and 3,061 ventilators are engaged for COVID treatment.
- During July 2020, a total of 39,579 households have received economic revival assistance in the form of livestock fodder, food packages, agricultural inputs, emergency interest free loans, small enterprise and kitchen gardening.
